The Gilead COMPASS Initiative® is tackling the HIV crisis in the Southern United States by partnering with local leaders, advocates, and community-based organizations to address the needs of people living with and affected by HIV. COMPASS is supported by its four Coordinating Centers at Emory University Rollins School of Public Health, Southern AIDS Coalition, University of Houston Graduate College of Social Work, and Wake Forest University School of Divinity.







Grounded in Community and Guided by Data

AIDSVu is an online mapping tool that visually shows the impact of the HIV epidemic across US communities using publicly available data from CDC, local health departments, and other high-quality sources. These maps, along with other data sources compiled by the Gilead COMPASS Initiative®, guided the Coordinating Centers' focus on the 12 Southern states we serve and our intentional investment in communities most impacted by the epidemic.
